Fraud Against Seniors, Document Authentication, and Police Media Relations

This training is Tuesday, April 29, 2008 from 8:30 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. and is co-sponsored by the Washington Co. Sheriff's Office. WCSO will host the training at the Washington County Sheriff's Office 215 SW Adams Avenue, Hillsboro, OR 97123

The instruction team comes from Crimeline-Whitlock Training Group and includes Mike Rausch, Crimeline-Whitlock President, and former news director for KGW-TV. Chuck Whitlock, Author, Investigator and Fraud Expert and Judith McGee, One of the country's top financial advisors and a senior fraud expert.

8:00AM is registration and check-in. 8:30 the sessions begin with police and media relations. 9:30AM to 11:30AM is identifying common documents and document authentication including driver's licenses, credit cards, checks and currency. Firearms Strategies for Female Officers

Ashland, 1st Oregon Segway

On July 4th, 2007 my Police Chief Terry Holderness watched as one of our hired Security Officers maneuvered his way around our "huge" parade on a Segway. Later that week, I was informed that he had arranged for a "test drive" of the Segway and wanted me to be there.

My assignment as Patrol Officer is Central Area Patrol (CAP). What that entails is patrolling the downtown area of Ashland and the City's eighteen parks, and supervising summer Park Patrol.

On that day with a small amount of training the Chief and I headed downtown. At first it felt awkward. There is a lot of balancing and body movement to the direction that you want the Segway to go (it's a great workout). But before long you think you're a Pro. The Chief and I made it back to the station and the rest is history.

We purchased a Segway and I have been on it pretty much ever since. The advantages are numerous. It is convenient in a crowded business area and during events. I have worked this position on bike and on foot and there is no comparison. I get around quicker and turn on a dime.

I get to calls quicker and am not winded. On the Segway I am taller and see more of what is happening around me and am free of the clumsy maneuvering associated with a bike. The Segway is quiet, I have driven up on people who have no idea I am there. The Segway can go on sand, gravel, and bark almost anything but ice. The fuel efficiency and savings is incredible. The Segway is battery operated and there is no problem working a shift on one battery.

The public loves it! Since riding the Segway I have had more public contact than in the last 14 years. I heard over and over how much more approachable I am on the Segway. I have people pull up along side of me to ask directions or just stop and chat about the Segway and then one thing leads to another.

During the Summer I had tourists from all over the U.S. and abroad stopping for photographs and asking questions. One citizen said "They (the Segway) are a positive influence on Police work."

Segway with police package (lights, siren, decals, saddle bags) runs about \$6,000.

Child Abuse and Shaken Baby Syndrome

Shaken Baby Syndrome, first described as a syndrome in 1974, can be lethal: approximately one shaken baby in four dies from the injuries. Those who survive may suffer blindness caused by bleeding around the brain and eyes, or disabling brain damage, including mental retardation (mild to severe), paralysis, seizure disorder, speech and learning disabilities, neck and back damage, and dislocated bones.

Many incidents of Shaken Baby Syndrome are not reported out of fear. Officers who respond to evaluate a baby for the possibility of such injuries should know that early medical attention may avoid more serious complications and even DEATH. When in doubt, seek medical intervention.

Following is a case which illustrates the importance of aggressive investigation when children's lives are at stake. A baby's life was saved by officers who recognized the symptoms of SBS:

Two Portland officers responded to a 3 am noise complaint - a baby crying. The neighbor who called 911 told them she was certain she heard a baby crying in the neighboring apartment. She described the baby sounding in distress and the neighbor woman screaming, and then suddenly there was abrupt silence.

A young woman answered the officer's knock. They asked if the baby was OK. She denied she had a baby, motioning toward two small children asleep on a nearby couch. The two officers asked if they could just come in, check to see if the kids were safe and leave. She became defensive, blocking the door. She just got her two kids to sleep, she claimed, - it must have been the television the neighbor heard.

The officers entered the apartment against her resistance. They found the children in the living room were fine. However, in a bedroom, they found a baby girl about 3 weeks old. The child had no startle reflex, and was limp. When they peeled back the eyelids, they noticed the pupils were unresponsive to their flashlight, one eye pinpoint and the other dilated. Heartbeat was very faint and breathing extremely shallow.

As one officer carefully lifted the baby, it immediately had a seizure; then stopped breathing. Being just 5 minutes away from Legacy Emanuel hospital, they did not call an ambulance. One officer began CPR - the other drove to the ER. Another officer preserved the scene until the Child Abuse Team and DHS could respond.

The suspect, the baby's aunt, later confessed to detectives she had severely shaken the child. She was upset the baby was crying too much.

The attending ER doctor said the baby was minutes away from dying and had the officers not taken the actions they did, to investigate, protect and provide lifesaving efforts, the child would certainly have died. Fortunately the baby survived without any permanent physical or mental problems.

The suspect pled guilty.

Some Symptoms of SBS & SIBS cases:

- Head turned to one side.
- Unable to lift or turn head.
- Pinpointed, dilated, or unequal size pupils.
- Inability of eyes to focus or track movement.
- Pupils unresponsive to light.
- Blood pooling in the eyes.
- Bulging or spongy forehead, soft spot bulging.
- No smiling or vocalization.
- Poor sucking or swallowing.
- Rigidity or posturing.
- Semi-consciousness, lethargy, or decreased muscle tone.
- Difficulty breathing, shallow breaths.
- Seizures or spasms.
- Swollen head may appear later.

Warning Signs of Injury:

- Poor feeding / eating, decreased appetite
- Vomiting for no apparent reason.
- Pale or bluish skin.
- Grab-type bruises on arms or chest are rarely seen.
- Extreme irritability.
- Failure to thrive.
- Cardiopulmonary arrest.
- Coma
